Why Students Don't Choose Teaching

As many as 44 percent of students, considered going into education but chose another major or career path.

Considered teaching but chose something else

Students who considered teaching but chose something else did so based on other personal interests and a belief that teacher salaries could not support their desired standard of living.

REASONS NOT TO TEACH
